In this webinar, participants will learn the latest evidence-based tools for addressing opioid use in the primary care setting, including: guideline-based chronic pain management, overdose education and naloxone distribution (OEND), screening, brief intervention and referral to treatment (SBIRT) for opioid use disorder (OUD), and providing office-based OUD treatment (OBOT) with an X waiver.
